**FAIR VISITORS WILL SEE
EXHIBIT HOMES FOR DUCKS**

Sportsmen visiting the state fair opening here (Richmond) on September 28 will have a chance to see a model of the homes for ducks being restored by the U. S. Biological Survey, officials of the Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries promised today.

Arranged by the Commission in cooperation with the Survey, the wildlife exhibit at the fair will include also two sets showing the white-tailed deer of the east and the mule deer of the west in typical scenes. As in previous years, the reception room of the wildlife section will represent a hunter's cabin with trophy-hung walls, and a representative of the Federal Bureau will be on hand to provide visitors with further information on the national program for wildlife restoration and on the work of the Biological Survey, officials of the Game Commission said.

Live ducks, according to the officials, will be part of the exhibit showing the type of areas being restored for the use of the birds. The ducks will have the privilege of paddling to heart's content on a miniature lake in the foreground of the refuge set, while a painted background of marsh-land with hills in the distance will be provided to make the birds feel at home. An accompanying waterfowl set shows another typical refuge scene with birds in flight, includes mounted specimens of various species of wild fowl, and points the moral, "Future duck shooting depends on present conservation."
