

Manchester, Iowa, and the State Hatchery at Lanesboro, Minn. Some of the Ohrids will be retained at the Manchester Hatchery as brood fish and others will be stocked in suitable lakes on an experimental basis.

The Ohrid trout, named for a lake in Yugoslavia, normally spawn on gravel beaches and do not require flowing water as do many other trout. For this reason, researchers believe they may prove useful for stocking some lakes in the United States. Adult Ohrid trout sometimes attain a weight of 8 pounds.

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United States Buys Fishmeal from Peru

Washington, D. C.: Peru, which has replaced Japan as the world's leading nation in weight of fishery products landed, exported 348,000 tons of fishmeal to the United States in 1964. This was 79 percent of the total imported. Fishmeal is used extensively in poultry and animal feeds.

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Fishing at Fort Apache

Fort Apache Indian Reservation, Arizona: The Department of the Interior's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife says tribal interests on The Fort Apache Indian Reservation grossed about \$900,000 last year from services to sportsmen.

Sale of fishing permits alone on the reservation brought about \$75,000 during 1964. The remaining revenue came from lodging, boat rental, guide services, and automobile facilities. Fishermen days on the reservation totaled 244,900, a 20 percent increase over 1963. Reservation records show that nearly 10 percent of the fishermen were non-Arizona residents.

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"Waterfowl Tomorrow" in Second Printing

Washington, D. C.: A second printing of 19,000 copies of "Waterfowl Tomorrow" has been completed by the Government Printing Office. The book, a publication of the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, is regarded as the most comprehensive work on migratory waterfowl ever published. It is available from the Government Printing Office at \$4 per copy. It is also available from the Queen's Printer in Canada.
