FORMER MISSOURIAN NAMED INFORMATION CHIEF WITH FEDERAL WILDLIFE AGENCY

Dan Saults, 54, a native of Missouri, has been named Chief, Office of Conservation Education, with the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. He was formerly Information Officer with Interior's Bureau of Land Management.

In announcing the reassignment, John S. Gottschalk, Director of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, said:

"We are glad to have Mr. Saults head our conservation education efforts. He has an outstanding background in the conservation field."

Saults was born in Knob Noster, Missouri, attended public schools there, and was graduated from the University of Missouri's School of Journalism in 1932. He worked on several newspapers, became an infantryman in 1942, and rose from private to captain while serving with the 85th Infantry Division in North Africa and Italy.

After the war, Saults returned to Missouri and in 1947 became editor of the Missouri Conservationist, monthly magazine of the Missouri Conservation Commission. He became Chief of the Commission's Section of Information two years later, and in 1957 was promoted to Assistant Director of the Commission. He left Missouri in 1964 to become Information Officer for Interior's Bureau of Land Management. Saults wrote each month's lead editorial in the Missouri Conservationist during his 17 years with the Missouri Conservation Commission.
